## Comet Hyakutake A Real Showstopper

Reports throughout the state were phenomenal. Observations of a tail stretching more than 60 degrees were not uncommon. Even in the light polluted areas (most of the state) the tail could be seen stretching across more than 20 degrees of sky!

### March Board Meeting

Summary of the UACNJ Board of Directors Meeting, Mar 30 1996 UACNJ Observatory at Jenny Jump State Park

The meeting opened at 10:54AM to very light delegate attendance. An agenda was distributed. Brief reports from the delegates were requested, which will be a regular agenda item. Upcoming events were noted: the Rockland event (now past), the Morris Museum Astronomy Day event on April 13th, Jersey Starquest on June 14th through 16th at Beemerville. UACNJ Treasurer Tom Massey's written report showed a net balance of \$5871.80 less recent bills.

In Old Business, Barry reported the soda machine was installed and operating. Sodas are 75 cents each. He reported no new observatory site deposits were received, so the last site foundation will be developed and run by UACNJ, possibly to be purchased later by a UACNJ club. The current depositors for sites are AAAP, HLO, SSG and AAI. There was discussion by Ralph and Barry about site use as a solar observatory with help from AAI.

In New Business, Barry reported that Observatory site development plans and schedules were discussed in a February meeting of the Observatory Committee with site representatives from the clubs. Details were distributed to clubs and UACNJ members. He noted a special need for planning on May 4th for a "long day" of activities on May 18th to grade and bulldoze the observatory and parking sites. For Publicity, Volume II Number III

Barry said he would look for a person to provide help with publicity.

Larry Smith was reported to be working on an Exxon grant proposal with Don Kruse and Mike Luciuk. Saul reported 38 people have individual Observatory memberships, and he is working on obtaining renewals. Ron provided a list of paid (10) and non-paid member clubs, and he will send the nonpaying clubs their previous form in his request for renewal. He reported the Constitutional Committee is meeting. They plan to talk to people to solicit information and for suggestions. The Security Committee has purchased security locks and the combination lock on the gate has been changed - Barry or Saul should be contacted for details.

In other New Business, we discussed the comet activities at Jenny Jump and other sites, and the amount of public interest. Barry will develop a list of public attendance rules.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:12 AM.

This will be one of the few Saturdays that you won't have to break a sweat working around the observatory. Instead you'll break a sweat playing volleyball or Frisbee! During the day, scopes will be doing solar and planetary observing, the evening is the usual Saturday Star Party. This is great opportunity for you to come out and meet the people who make Jenny Jump a success.

We need your support to make the Observatory a success. If you're already a supporting member of the Consortium then you know that yearly dues are due. Regular membership is \$20, Sustaining memberships cost \$50. Your dues help pay the bills that are incurred at the Observatory to keep it operating. This may sound like a bega-thon but that money is needed to help keep this fine dark sky site available to amateur astronomers.
